Latest Developments

In a newly-released report, AGPS documented the death of 3,987 Palestinian refugees in and from war-torn Syria since March 2011 until June 2019 due to war-released incidents.

The report sheds light on the number of victims and detainees since the outbreak of of the conflict until June 2019.

The second part of the report covers the death toll of the first half of 2019.

The third part is devoted to data about displaced Palestinians during the period under study.



Data included in the report is based on statistics released by UNRWA and local NGOs operating outside of UNRWA's fields of operation.

The report is another chain in the series of studies released by AGPS in an attempt to spotlight the situation of Palestinian refugees in the embattled Syrian territories.



Data on the time, location, gender, age, and status (civilian, military) figures in the report.

As appears in the report, AGPS does not hold a given party accountable for the war crimes committed in Syria. The situation, AGPS believes, is the outcome of different factors and crises wrought by all warring parties in Syria.

AGPS appeals to the International Criminal Court, among other international bodies, to urgently step in and prosecute those involved in war crimes and human rights violations against civilians, including Palestinian refugees.

In another development, the Palestinian Ambassador in Ankara Fayed Mustafa discussed with Istanbul's Mayor Akram Imam Oglu the calamitous situation of Palestinian refugees from Syria in Turkey and the impact of the recent crackdowns opted for by the Turkish government to rein in the influx of irregular migrants.



During a press conference held on Wednesday, August 7, Istanbul's Mayor vowed to establish an office to keep tabs on the refugees'



affairs by the end of this year and lend a hand to Palestinian families seeking shelter in Turkey.

Nearly 2,400 Palestinian families from Syria have sought shelter in Turkey, including 1,200 families in Istanbul, where they have been facing an abject situation.

Recently, Turkish police stepped down crackdowns and abduction sweeps, targeting irregular migrants and non-holders of the kimlik visa card in Istanbul.

Meanwhile, the Turkish coast guard arrested on Friday, August 9, 33 Palestinian refugees, including Palestinians from Syria, off Bodrum seashore, in the Turkish province of Mugla while onboard a Greece-bound ship.



According to AGPS data, 53 Palestinians from Syria, mostly women, children, and elderly refugees, drowned onboard the death boats to Europe, fleeing the tattered Syrian territories.

A number of casualties breathed their last off the Libyan seashores on way to Italy while others sunk in Marmara waters as they tried to reach the Greek coast. Dozens of migrants have gone missing.



In the meantime, dozens of children and teens joined a cleaning campaign kickstarted in Khan Dannun Camp for Palestinian refugees as part of an initiative launched by UNRWA to clean up residential alleyways and enhance hygiene in the area.

Living conditions in Khan Dannun have sharply deteriorated due to the lack of financial resources and high unemployment rates wrought by the raging warfare. A transportation crisis has added bad to worse.

Upon more than once occasion, civilians have railed against the mounds of trash and debris piled up in civilian neighborhoods and around the main access roads to the camp, resulting in bed smells and the spread of life-threatening diseases and rodents.
