Latest Developments

Palestinian refugees Khaled Ahmed AlAbtah, detained in Edirne prison since July 22, 2019, and Ahmad Jamil AlSayed, held in custody since July 30, were released from Turkish prisons.

Both refugees were arrested in a sweep launched by Turkish police against irregular migrants and non-holders of the kimlik visa card in Istanbul.

Recently, Turkish police stepped down crackdowns and abduction sweeps, targeting irregular migrants and non-holders of the kimlik visa card in Istanbul.



Nearly 2,400 Palestinian families from Syria have sought shelter in Turkey, including 1,200 families in Istanbul, where they have been facing an abject situation.

In another development, the Swedish Migration Agency said 70% of Palestinian academics in 2018 have specialized in scientific fields, including engineering, physics, and mathematics.

Researcher Mohamed Yousef said that in 2015, 75% of Palestinian men from Syria opted for scientific branches. In 2018, 71% of



Palestinian women from Syria in Sweden pursued arts and humanities.

In the meantime, representatives of the Palestine Liberation Organization and other Palestinian factions paid a visit to the new AlShuhadaa Cemetery in Yarmouk Camp for Palestinian refugees, in Damascus.



Yarmouk Camp is home to two cemeteries, where the bodies of Palestinians killed during the Nakba (May 15, 2011) and Naksa (June 5, 2011) along with those killed in the Palestinian Revolution, are buried.

The Syrian government forces regained control over Yarmouk Camp and southern Damascus towns following a 33-day military operation launched on April 19, 2018. At least 33 civilians were killed and dozens more injured in the offensive. Over 60% of buildings in Yarmouk Camp have been either totally or partially destroyed in the warfare. 90% of homes have been subjected to burglary and looting.



Meanwhile, games were organized by volunteers from the Mulhem Group for children taking shelter in Deir Ballout refugee camp, north of Syria.

Over 325 displaced Palestinian families in Deir Ballout Camp have been enduring a tragic situation. Most of them have been crammed in poorly-equipped tents and denied access to vital services.
