



"Pro-Gov't Group in Syria Seizes Palestinian Property in Neirab Camp"

Latest Developments

The Action Group for Palestinians of Syria (AGPS) has warned of the misappropriation of Palestinian property and belongings by Liwaa AlQuds armed group, affiliated with the Syrian regime, in AlNeirab refugee camp under the pretext of affiliations with opposition groups.

Entitled, "Seizing Palestinian Refugees' Property", the report documents the takeover of a house and two commercial stores owned by Palestinian prisoner Yousef Dahoudi, along with three other houses belonging to displaced Palestinian families.

Liwaa AlQuds also seized a three-story building owned by Palestinian refugee Abdul Kader Shalabi.

Liwaa AlQuds political chief Adel Abdul Haq grabbed the house of Palestinian pediatrician Yousef Salim and a sewing factory on claims that it is located in a strategic zone and overlooks a farmland where opposition forces had been allegedly deployed.

In another development, hundreds of displaced Palestinian families have entered Yarmouk Camp, in Damascus, to inspect their homes from which they have been displaced for over two years.

Over recent years, pro-government militias have been raking through evacuated homes in Yarmouk and holding sway over furniture, copper, iron, and kitchenware belonging to displaced families.



Reports of theft have emerged after Syrian government forces grabbed hold of the camp and burglarized civilian homes.

The Syrian government forces regained control over Yarmouk Camp and southern Damascus towns following a 33-day military operation launched in April 2018. Dozens of civilians were killed and dozens more injured in the offensive. Over 60% of buildings have gone either totally or partially destroyed in the warfare.

Palestinian families displaced from Yarmouk Camp continue to call on the concerned authorities to allow them a safe return to their homes and to press ahead with reconstruction projects.

Along similar lines, Palestinian families taking shelter in Qudsaya town, in Rif Dimashq, continue to sound the alarm over the security turmoil overwhelming the area and the heavy deployment of political security forces across residential alleyways.

Local activists said a number of young men were arrested by the government security forces in Qudsaya, amid rising concerns about forced military conscription with pro-government squads.

According to the same sources, the Syrian security forces have tightened military grip around Qudsaya and stepped up arbitrary manhunts at government-run checkpoints.

Some 6,000 Palestinian families displaced from Yarmouk Camp, south of Damascus, continue to face dire socio-economic conditions in Qudsaya.



Meanwhile, Palestinian refugee Najib Sweiti has been held in Syrian state prisons since September 2017.

Najib was abducted near Damascus International Airport on his way back to Syria, coming from Jordan, to reunite with his family. His fate and condition remain mysterious.

AGPS documented the incarceration of 1,724 Palestinian prisoners in government-run dungeons in war-torn Syria, where they have been enduring mysterious fates.

In the meantime, Palestinian refugees from Syria sheltered in migrant camps set up on the Greek island of Samos continue to sound distress signals over the exacerbated humanitarian condition they have been subjected to.

Speaking with AGPS, the refugees said they have been enduring medical neglect and poor hygiene, along with the lack of relief assistance in the makeshift tents they have been locked up in.

Hundreds of Palestinian refugees from Syria have been stranded in makeshift tents and under-equipped reception halls on Greek islands.

AGPS has kept record of the death of dozens of refugees onboard Greece-bound ships. Several others have been arrested by Turkish coast guards.
