Latest Developments

Palestinian children taking shelter in Yarmouk Camp have appealed to UNRWA and the General Authority for Palestinian Refugees to work on reconstructing their destroyed schools so as to enable them to pursue their coveyvessed studies.

In a meeting held some few days earlier with the education chief in Yarmouk Camp, Walid AlKurdi, the parents said the war prevented their children from attending classes outside of the camp.

The meeting was held at the destroyed AlJarmak School. Over 30 students were in attendance.



Available data by UNRWA indicate that 32 UNRWA facilities have been reduced to rubble in Yarmouk Camp, including 16 schools.

Several UNRWA facilities were destroyed in the Syrian warfare and others have gone out of operation, including two clinics, a vocational training center, a youth development center, and 28 schools, out of 112 UNRWA schools in Syria.

The residents called for opening up the local school, recruiting qualified teaching staff, and securing transportation means back to and from the camp.



Along the same line, director of UNRWA operations in Aleppo Mohamed Shreitah and director of the General Authority for Palestinian Refugees, Ahmed Ibrahim, popped in Handarat refugee camp in Aleppo to keep tabs on the condition of power and water networks in the camp.

Palestinian refugees in Handarat Camp have been grappling with dire conditions due to the acute dearth in drinking-water supplies and breakdowns in local power networks.



Sometime earlier, a memorandum handed over by the General Authority for Palestinian Arab Refugees to the Director-General of Aleppo's Water Supply and Sewerage Company called for an urgent response to the crisis and for the rehabilitation of water networks to Palestinian returnees.

Massive destruction wrought on the camp by Syria's bloody warfare led to the deportation of hundreds of civilians from their homes in Handarat on April 27, 2013.

According to data by the General Authority for Palestinian Arab Refugees, some 8,000 Palestinian refugees used to take shelter in Handarat Camp.



In another development, 15 members of the Palestine Liberation Army (PLA) were pronounced dead after they broke away from the battalion. Several others were tortured to death in Syrian government jails.

The list includes Lieutenant Iyas Naimi, who died under shelling in Yarmouk Camp on July 30, 2013.

Seven others died under torture: Handball coach Osama AlKhadra, Sergeant Muhammad Hamdan, commander Mohammed Farah, Abdul Rahman Khartabil, Ihab Mousa, Mohammed Fourani, and Ahmed Hawash.

Sergeant Major Mar'i AlMadani was executed by an opposition group in Yarmouk Camp on charges of insulting God. Khaled AlHasan died in clashes with ISIS militias in Yarmouk Camp. Basil Azzam was killed in a Russian aggression on Idlib.

Scores of Palestinian youths have been forced to join the PLA. Those who refuse forced conscription are often subjected to manhunt and imprisonment. Thousands of young men have fled the country in the hunt for a safer shelter.

In the meantime, the SAGA sports program in the German city of Hamburg labeled the Palestinian young man from Syria Hadi Ibrahim, formerly sheltered in AlAyedeen refugee camp in Hums, as the football league's top scorer. He was awarded the league cup.

Hadi's team Altona93 snatched the first place among youth football teams.



Dozens of success stories have been achieved by Palestinian students from Syria nationwide and overseas.
