## **Latest Developments**

Norwegian cops arrested a Palestinian refugee from Syria and others as they protested against members of the SIAN anti-Muslim organization who set fire to Holy Quran.

Members of fanatic SIAN group took to the streets in the southern Norwegian city of Kristiansand and threw copies of the Holy Quran in garbage containers. A member of the organization set fire to a Quran book, to which Palestinian young man Kusay Rashid and his uncle Yaser Salama along with other bystanders by heavily beating the fanatic, before they got rounded up by police.



Stop Islamisation of Norway (Norwegian: Stopp islamiseringen av Norge, SIAN) is a Norwegian organization which was established in 2008, although its history goes back to a group started in 2000. Its stated aim is to work against Islam, which it defines as a totalitarian political ideology that violates the Norwegian Constitution as well as democratic and human values.

In another development, a displaced Palestinian woman in northern Syria who suffers from a leg disease said she has been unable to secure treatment fees in the poverty-stricken area.



Speaking on condition of anonymity, the refugee denounced the absence of financial support by UNRWA, saying she suffers from an unstable knee joint and anterior cruciate ligament tear, according to medical checks carried out at the Furat Medical Complex.

The 18-year-old refugee needs a magnetic resonance imaging of keen cartilage and ligaments. She continues to appeal to the concerned humanitarian bodies to help her secure much-needed treatment fees.



The young lady has been taking refuge in AlSadaka camp after she was deported from Yarmouk Camp, in Damascus, to northern Syria in 2018. Her husband has been held in Syrian government jails.

Displaced Palestinian families in AlSadaka Camp, west of AlBal village, in Aleppo's northern town of Suran, continue to sound distress signals over the dire humanitarian conditions in the area due to the absence of vital services and relief assistance.



Meanwhile, 15 members of the Palestine Liberation Army (PLA) were pronounced dead after they broke away from the battalion. Several others were tortured to death in Syrian government jails.

The list includes Lieutenant Iyas Naimi, who died under shelling in Yarmouk Camp on July 30, 2013. Seven others died under torture: Handball coach Osama AlKhadra, Sergeant Muhammad Hamdan, Commander Mohammed Farah, Abdul Rahman Khartabil, Ihab Mousa, Mohammed Fourani, and Ahmed Hawash. The latter was arrested from a military site in Mesyaf.

Sergeant Major Mar'i AlMadani was executed by an opposition group in Yarmouk Camp on charges of insulting God. Khaled AlHasan died in clashes with ISIS militias in Yarmouk Camp. Basil Azzam was killed in a Russian aggression on Idlib.

Scores of Palestinian youths have been forced to join the PLA. Those who refuse forced conscription are often subjected to manhunt and imprisonment. Thousands of young men have fled the country in the hunt for a safer shelter.

In the meantime, Doctors Without Borders (MSF) announced on Nov. 16 that a 9-month-old baby died in the Moria refugee camp in Greece.

"We have confirmed today by the local hospital in #Lesbos that a 9-month-old baby has died some days ago from severe dehydration in #Moria camp #Greece," MSF said on Twitter.

The medical charity group said children are dying in Greece due to horrific living conditions and a lack of adequate care.



Nearly 15,000 people are trapped in Moria, among them, 5,000 minors, it said, as it urged Greece and the EU to take immediate action.

At least 1,000 migrants have died this year in the Mediterranean Sea, UN data has indicated.

The International Organization for Migration (IOM) said at least 15,000 victims lost their lives in the Mediterranean crossings since 2014.

The Moria refugee camp on Lesbos, Greece, was designed for 3,000 people. There is currently over 13,000 people living there.

Overpopulated refugee camps cause a shortage of resources, not least healthcare. Often mental health issues are overlooked, despite many refugees having experienced severe trauma.
