"Property-Theft Attempts Ongoing in Yarmouk Camp for Palestinian Refugees"

- 90 Palestinians from Syria Disembarked on Greek Island over Past 3
 Days
- 80 Migrants Intercepted by Turkish Coast Guard
- Cash Aids Transferred to Palestinians from Syria in Lebanon



Latest Developments

Flocks of vehicles continue to be caught stealing furniture from destroyed buildings and abandoned homes in Yarmouk Camp for Palestinian refugees, in Damascus.

Over recent years, pro-government militias have been raking through evacuated homes in Yarmouk and holding sway over brass pots and kitchen ware belonging to displaced families.

Reports of theft have emerged after Syrian government forces grabbed hold of the camp and reportedly burglarized civilian homes. Pro-government troops stole electric kit, furniture, and wares, among other equipment.

The Syrian government forces regained control over Yarmouk Camp and southern Damascus towns following a 33-day military operation launched in April 2018. Dozens of civilians were killed and dozens more injured in the offensive. Over 60% of buildings have gone either totally or partially destroyed in the warfare.





Palestinian families displaced from Yarmouk Camp called on the concerned authorities to allow them a safe return to their homes and press ahead with reconstruction projects.

In another development, some 90 Palestinian refugees from Syria landed in Greece after they set sail from Turkey onboard rubber boats.

The Greek government is deeply concerned over the reported 17 percent increase in migrant and refugee arrivals in recent weeks, saying close to 20,000 migrants are currently staying in overcrowded camps on Greek islands in the eastern Aegean Sea.



Palestinian refugees from Syria who have been stranded in Greece continue to sound distress signals after most European states opted for a closed-door immigration policy, leaving hundreds of refugees trapped in underequipped makeshift refugee camps.

An agreement between Turkey and Greece to tighten grip on refugees from Syria trying to creep into the Greek territories via the Turkish borders has made the situation far worse.



Along the same line, 80 irregular migrants, including 31 children and three Palestinian refugees, were intercepted by the Turkish coast guard, trying to cross into Europe.

According to the Turkish authorities, 29 migrants are from Syria, three from Palestine, one from Eritrea, and another from Sudan.

Meanwhile, UNRWA has transferred cash aids for the Palestinians of Syria in Lebanon via ATM cards.

Every Palestinian family from Syria received a rental allowance of \$100 and a food allowance worth 27\$ per every refugee.

Nearly 28,000 Palestinian refugees from Syria seeking shelter in Lebanon have been subjected to dire socio-economic conditions and a precarious legal status as the Lebanese authorities continue to rebuff their appeals for legal visas and access to the local labor market.
