Daily report on the situation of Palestinian refugees in Syria



"3,911 Palestinian Refugees from Syria Pronounced Dead until End of 2018"

Latest Developments

AGPS has documented the death of 3,911 Palestinian refugees from Syria, including hundreds of women and children, since 2011, as a result of war-related incidents.

AGPS found out that hundreds of refugees were killed under shelling and hundreds of others were fatally gunned down.



At least 564 refugees were tortured to death in Syrian dungeons while 205 others died as a result of medical neglect and the tough blockade imposed by Syria's government forces on Yarmouk Camp.

Scores of Palestinian refugees have also been left wounded, including dozens who have undergone limp amputation or eye loss.

Over 1,710 Palestinians have, meanwhile, been enduring mysterious fates in Syrian state dungeons, according to AGPS data.

A report on the number of victims, their geographical distribution, and the leading causes of death is slated to be released by AGPS in the next few days.



In another development, fires broke out at the Plastic Factory near UNRWA schools in Jaramana Camp for Palestinian Refugees in Rif Dimashq as a result of fireworks played in the area. Material damage was inflicted on civilian property.



The locals appealed for an immediate response by the concerned authorities, warning of the material and human upshots of fireworks played in residential alleyways.

In the meantime, pro-government militias continue to loot civilian homes in Yarmouk Camp for Palestinian refugees, south of Damascus.

Pictures circulated on social media networks show a group of thieves leaving Yarmouk Camp while carrying equipment belonging to displaced families.

Palestinian families have called on the concerned Syrian authorities, the Palestine Liberation Organization, and UNRWA to work on granting them a safe return to their homes and press ahead with reconstruction projects.



The Syrian government forces regained control over Yarmouk Camp and southern Damascus towns following a 33-day military operation launched in April 2018. Dozens of civilians were killed and dozens more injured in the offensive. Over 80% of buildings have gone either totally or partially destroyed in the warfare.



Meanwhile, Palestinian refugee Amer Abu Azzam, from Jaramana Camp, won the first place in a three-kilometer race held in Damascus.

Abu Azzam also won the third place in an international race staged by DHL Company.

Dozens of Palestinian refugees achieved success stories inside and outside of the ravaged Syrian territories.

Meanwhile, AGPS has issued its daily report number 2,250, both in the Arabic and English languages. 365 reports documenting the situation of the Palestinians of Syria had been released by AGPS during 2018 alone.



A series of events and contributions have been made independently by AGPS or as part of international human rights platforms to speak up for the Palestinians of Syria.

One such contribution was made at the UNHRC's 39th session held in Geneva. In a report passed on to the UNHRC in Geneva on September 19, 2018, AGPS, in partnership with the Palestinian Return Centre (PRC), sounded the alarm over the situation of the Palestinian refugees deported to northern Syria.

A research paper was released by AGPS as part of the Forum of Palestinians in Europe and the Nation's Causes held in Berlin on Sunday, September 23, 2018 under the slogan "We Will Not Give up Our Right of Return". The paper tackled the calamitous situation of the Palestinians of Syria owing to the blockade, arbitrary arrests, forced displacement, and heavy shelling.

On June 25, 2018, AGPS delivered a letter urging donor parties to boost UNRWA funds during a conference held in New York.
