## **Latest Developments**

At least five persons, including a child from AlMesri family, were left wounded in AlNeirab Camp for Palestinian refugees, in Aleppo, following a shooting attack carried out by the so-called Mazen Abu Dheis, from Liwaa AlQuds battalion, affiliated with the Syrian government forces.

Sometime earlier, Liwaa AlQuds militias kidnapped the Palestinian refugee Mahmoud Rafe', aged 58 and identified as the father of commander Samer Rafe', who was arrested by the Syrian government forces over charges of corruption and arms sales.



Tension has been running high in AlNeirab Camp as a result of the uncontrolled possession of weapons by pro-government militias.

In another development, a number of Palestinian refugees from Syria joined a vigil staged outside of the UNRWA building in the Jordanian capital city of Amman, protesting the agency's poor services.



The refugees handed over a letter to UNRWA's deputy director to urge the agency to shell out its monthly allowances so as to help the refugees pay their rental fees and other charges, including power and water bills.

UNRWA staff members pledged to take the refugees' demands into serious consideration.



Palestinian refugees in Jordan receive a sum of 85 Jordanian Dinars as part of the winter allowances provided by the agency. A number of refugees receive no more than 20 dinars.

An assessment of UNRWA's output by the Palestinian refugee communities from Syria, as figures in a poll published by AGPS on its official website, found out that 61.4% of the refugees in Jordan believe the relief and cash aids provided by the agency do not meet their demands. 24.3% said they are insufficient.

15.7% of respondents also dubbed aid-delivery and reception as "life-threatening" while 34.3% said it is difficult, according to the same poll.



Meanwhile, residents of Khan Dannun Camp have been enduring abject living conditions as a result of the price leap, lack of basic services, and water and power blackouts, among other crises.

Upon more than once occasion, civilians have railed against the mounds of trash and debris piled up in civilian neighborhoods and around the main access roads to the camp, resulting in bed smells and the spread of life-threatening diseases and rodents.

The residents have also often set off alarm bells over the acute water crisis rocking the camp, forcing civilians to purchase water from privately-owned tanks at steep prices.



The residents continue to call on the government institutions and UNRWA to urgently step in and work out the crises they have been subjected to at the soonest time possible.

Meanwhile, AGPS found out that 16 Palestinian refugees, among them a woman, were arrested across the Syrian territories in 2018, down from 28 refugees, including seven women, in 2017.



The list of 2018 arrestees includes six Palestinians from Yarmouk Camp, five from Khan Eshieh Camp, one Palestinian from AlAyedeen Camp in Hums, and another from AlNeirab Camp in Aleppo. Three more refugees were arrested in unknown locations.
