Latest Developments

The Documentation Center of Palestinian Refugees denied reports about underway attempts to transfer Palestinian refugees north of Syria.

The statement came in response to reports released by the The Violations Documentation Center (VDC) about the projected settlement of 1,500 displaced Palestinian families in Afrin.

The Documentation Center of Palestinian Refugees slammed the report as "politicized", saying VDC has not reached out to reliable parties before publishing the counterfeit news on its website.



The center said some 1,500 Palestinian families are momentarily taking shelter in Afrin, Gindires, and Deir Ballout, denying VDC's claim that 1,500 are currently taking refuge in Afrin.

The Documentation Center of Palestinian Refugees North of Syria was established in order to keep record of and provide personal data about the Palestinian refugees sheltered in northern Syria. The group cooperates with the concerned authorities to that end.



The center has reportedly seen the day in response to the absence of authentic civil records and official bodies documenting the personal data (including marriage contracts, birth date, death date, number of children and newborns etc...) of the Palestinian refugees who have been taking shelter in northern Syria.

In another development, fires burst out in the western plains of AlNeirab Camp for Palestinian refugees, in Aleppo, in the third such incident in two weeks.

The residents rushed to the scene to put out the fires, which resulted in heavy material damage.



Palestinian refugee families taking shelter in AlNeirab Camp continue to sound distress signals over the high rates of unemployment, water and power outages, along with the absence of healthcare services and vital medicines.

Meanwhile, the Palestinian Red Crescent-Lebanon, in cooperation with Palestine Children's Relief Fund, announced the arrival of a delegation of specialized surgeons to carry out eye surgeries for children aged between one and 16 years-old.



The move is slated to be carried out from June 16 to June 21 at Mahmoud AlHamshari Hospital in Sidon, south of Lebanon. Check-ups are worth 5,000 Lebanese Pounds. Concerned patients should send their personal data and medical report via whatsApp.

Nearly 28,000 Palestinian refugees from Syria seeking shelter in Lebanon have been subjected to dire socio-economic conditions and a precarious legal status as the Lebanese authorities continue to rebuff their appeals for legal visas and access to the local labor market.

In the meantime, 20 migrants, including 14 Palestinian refugees, were caught onboard a boat owned by the Turkish coast guard, trying to reach a Greek island.

Turkish sources said Palestinian, Syrian, and Iraqi migrants were intercepted by the Turkish coast guard off Yalıkavak's seashore, near Bodrum, in Muğla province on the Aegean coast of Turkey, trying to disembark on Kos Island.





Turkey has served as a major launch-off point for migrants fleeing Syria, among other war-stricken zones, onboard "death boats" bound for Europe.

AGPS kept record of the death of dozens of Palestinian refugees at sea, trying to reach European destinations.
