Victims

Palestinian refugee Mohamed Fuad Atiyeh, sheltered in Yarmouk Camp, was tortured to death in Syrian government dungeons.

Atieyh's death brings the number of Palestinians who died under torture in Syrian state prisons to 569, according to AGPS data.



Latest Developments

15 PLA members were pronounced dead after they broke away from the battalion. Several others were tortured to death in Syrian government jails.

The list includes Lieutenant Iyas Naimi, who died under shelling in Yarmouk Camp on July 30, 2013. Seven others died under torture: Handball coach Osama AlKhadra, Sergeant Muhammad Hamdan, commander Mohammed Farah, Abdul Rahman Khartabil, Ihab Mousa, Mohammed Fourani, and Ahmed Hawash.

Sergeant Major Mar'i AlMadani was executed by an opposition group in Yarmouk Camp on charges of insulting God. Khaled



AlHasan died in clashes with ISIS militias in Yarmouk Camp. Basil Azzam was killed in a Russian aggression on Idlib.

Scores of Palestinian youths have been forced to join the PLA. Those who refuse forced conscription are often subjected to manhunt and imprisonment. Thousands of young men have fled the country in the hunt for a safer shelter.

Meanwhile, Palestinian refugee Mahmoud Maw'ed, from Yarmouk Camp, has been secretly held in Syrian state prisons since February 2, 2014.

Over 1,724 Palestinian detainees have been enduring mysterious fates in Syrian government jails, among them 108 women and girls.



In another development, a free medical week has been launched at AlRa'i Hospital in the Lebanese city of Sidon on Friday. Free medical check-ups will be provided to ophthalmology patients regardless of their nationalities, from 09:00 a.m. to 12:00 a.m.

Patients suffering blue water, eye pressure, sight disorders, and retinal diseases have benefited from the initiative.



The number of Palestinians from Syria who have sought refuge in the Lebanese territories has shrunk back to 25,000 after thousands fled the country due to the dire socio-economic conditions they have been made to endure.
