Latest Developments

Three civilians, including a Palestinian refugee, sustained wounds due to the simmering clashes with ISIS militias in AlSadd neighborhood, in Deraa city, south of Syria.

Palestinian refugee Amar AlAyedi was gunned down in the chest as he tended to a wounded person in the area. A 60-year-old man also succumbed to his wounds.

Sometime earlier, local armed groups reportedly seized a number of buildings where ISIS militias had been taking shelter.

Over 15 families fled the southern corners of the camp after clashes flared up in the area.

In another development, member of the Executive Office at Damascus Governorate, Kays Ramadan, told the pro-regime SHAM FM radio station that a technical study is being conducted to rehabilitate the power network in Yarmouk Camp for Palestinian refugees, south of Damascus.

Ramadan said the power crisis is very complicated and large sums of money are needed to fix it.

He added that efforts have been underway to rehabilitate the sewerage and water networks.

Last week, Damascus Governor, Mohamed Tarek Kreishati, said efforts have been ongoing to bring life back to normal in the ravaged Yarmouk Camp, in cooperation with CSOs and concerned government bodies.

In the meantime, residents of Khan Eshieh camp for Palestinian refugees, in Rif Dimashq, said they have not received fuel supplies urgently needed with the advent of winter.

Palestinian refugee families taking shelter in the area continue to sound distress signals over the poor infrastructure, water and power outages, along with the absence of health care and transportation services. The swift price leap along with the high rates of unemployment and poverty have made the situation far worse.

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In the meantime, UNRWA said it will be delivering additional cash grants of 150 USD to every registered Palestinian refugee family from Syria in Lebanon.

The sum will be transferred with the regular cash grants slated to be disbursed on November 28 through OMT offices.

According to UNRWA, 87.3% of PRS live in poverty in the Lebanese territories; 95% are food insecure and 80% live on cash aid handed over by UNRWA.

Statistics covering the period until the end of 2021 indicate that nearly 29,000 displaced Palestinian refugees from Syria are taking shelter in Lebanon.

Over 470,000 refugees are registered with UNRWA in Lebanon. About 45 per cent of them live in the country's 12 refugee camps. Conditions in the camps are dire and characterized by overcrowding, poor housing conditions, unemployment, poverty and lack of access to justice.

Palestinians in Lebanon do not enjoy several important rights; for example, they cannot work in many professions and cannot own property (real estate). Because they are not formally citizens of another state, Palestine refugees are unable to claim the same rights as other foreigners living and working in Lebanon.
