Recent Updates

The besieged Palestinian refugees in the Yarmouk Camp in Damascus go on marches condemning the Zionist occupation closure to Al Aqsa Mosque, expressing their anger about the Arab and Muslim silence and negligence towards the Judaization policies practiced by the occupation authorities in Jerusalem.

The protesters raised slogans "From the Besieged Yarmouk to the Violated Aqsa", "We Are All Souls for Al Aqsa", "Our Aqsa, No Worries. We will protect you with our souls and blood", "Our rulers, why are you mute?! What Do You Care About If Not Al Aqsa??" It is noteworthy that the Regular Army and members of the PFGC continue to impose the strict siege for 483 days respectively, while the water cuts for the homes of the camp for 53 days amid the aggravating living crisis inside the camp.

On the other hand, UNRWA distributed limited quantities of food aid, but the distribution stopped after the snipers opened their fire towards a man in his fifties who was injured in foot.

In another context, water cuts crisis continues at Daraa Camp for Palestinian refugees south of Syria for 200 days respectively, in light of a severe shortage of medical services because of the clashes and the violent bombardment in addition to the great destruction of the camp after repeated shelling.

Unofficial statistics indicate that "70%" of civilian homes were damaged, prompting hundreds of families to flee, and forcing the rest of them to drink from the artesian wells that may be unsuitable for drinking water. In Damascus city, bombing and violent clashes broke out at Tiba town between the Syrian Regular Army and groups of the Syrian armed opposition, which led to the spread of panic in the ranks of Khan Danoun residents next to it, fearing of the extension of those clashes to reach their homes. It is referred that the camp receives hundreds of Palestinian families who were displaced from their camps because of the siege, the shelling, and the clashes.

On the other hand, Internet service returned back to work to all areas of Damascus, after being cut for six hours as a result of maintenance, as announced by the PTC, while most of the Palestinian refugee camps suffer of poor internet service and communication, while this service is still cut off from the Yarmouk camp for more than a year.

In Hama, the Palestinian refugees in Al Aedein Camp live in a state of relative quite in light of their continued economic suffering, unemployment constitute the most prominent causes, in addition to the high cost of living and high rents of homes, especially after the displacement of many residents from surrounding areas to escape the shelling and clashes.

The Palestinian Camps in Syria, Numbers and Statistics:

- ***The Yarmouk Camp:*** - Siege, imposed by the Regular Army and PFGC, continued for **483** days respectively. In addition, power cuts continued for more than **566** days, water was cut for **53** days respectively. The number of victims due to the siege has reached **155** victims.
- **38** Palestinian refugees were killed outside of Syria including **36** while trying to reach Europe.
- **92** PLO members were killed due to Clashes in Syria.
- ***Al Husayneyya Camp:*** - Regular Army is still preventing the residents of the camp to return back to their houses for **385** days respectively.
- ***Al Sbeina Camp:*** - Regular Army is still preventing the residents of the camp to return back to their houses for **354** days respectively.



- **Handarat Camp:** - Residents have left the camp for **554** days after the Syrian Opposition Groups controlled it.
- **Dara'a Camp:** - It is now almost **200** days without water and a complete absence of basic services.
- **Khan Al Sheih Camp:** - Roads linking the camp to the city center are still closed except for Zakia road.
- **Khan Danoun Camp:** - Economic crisis is still continuing, specially unemployment and high prices.
- **Al Nairab Camp:** - Power is still cut for more than a year.
- **Jermana, AL Saieda ZAINAB, Al Raml, Al Aedein Camps in Homs and Hamma:** - A relatively quite situation in light of the economic crises.
