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''Warnings of Rabies Spread after a Child Died in the Yarmouk Camp''

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Victims

The PFLP-GC funeral the Palestinian young man 'Fadi Hani Tameem' Abu Shadi, while media resources reported that he died during confrontations with the armed opposition in the Yarmouk camp. The GC is a Pro-Syrian Regime and has dozens of fighters who fight



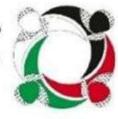
alongside the Syrian Army against the opposition groups in the Yarmouk camp.

Recent Updates

Medical cadres in the Yarmouk camp warned of rabies spread following the child, 'Nidal Murad,' died two days ago after being bite by a mad dog.



They called the need to take precautions from dogs through vaccination, and to avoid or terminate the contagious animal, since a number of dogs became infected-bearing viruses in the besieged camp, and feed on dead bodies in several neighborhoods of Al Hajar Al Aswad and the camp.



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The remaining people of the Yarmouk camp in Damascus, who estimated with 3000-5000 civilians, are suffering of acute shortage of medical services, because of the continued siege imposed by the regular army and PFGC groups, which prevents whereby the introduction of medicines needed to fight diseases and epidemics only a few and rarely, while the number of siege victims has reached 184 victims died due to starvation and lack of medical care.

Sayeda Zainab camp in Damascus suburb, which is controlled by the Syrian army and popular committees, is considered one of the relatively peaceful Palestinian camps, but the population is suffering from an economic crisis increased the burdensome costs on the Palestinian family, with the weakness of financial resources and the spread of unemployment, prompting some of them to travel or work out in the proregime popular Committees.



At the beginning of 2013, armed opposition groups entered the camp, and after violent clashes and shelling for 7 months, the Syrian army entered the camp, and then the pro-regime Palestinian popular committees took over the task of protecting the camp.



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Those battles have had adverse effects on the camp and its residents; devastation is still a witness in the camp, which came on a large part of it, while several residents died; reports estimated them with 100 victims and 200 injuries between amputation and permanent disabilities. The AGPS documented the names of 42 victims.

Turning to the south of Syria, water still cuts at Daraa camp for 567 days respectively, prompting residents to completely rely on well water, in addition to power cut that exacerbating the extract of water, forcing them to rely on diesel engines to raise water from wells.

The repeated shelling and clashes that targeted the camp resulted in the destruction of 70% of the camp's buildings, prompting hundreds of families to flee to other towns and refugee camps.

In Damascus suburb, a state of resentment and discontent spread among the people of Khan Dannon camp because of the neglect of UNRWA, the Syrian government agencies, and the pro-regime Palestinian factions about delivering.

Residents of the camp are suffering from relief absence in light of the difficult economic conditions in which they live due to the lack of charitable associations or civil work committees the camp as a result of security restrictions by the regime forces, in addition to the arrest campaigns of several relief activists.

Those committees were forced to stop working in order to preserve the lives of activists.



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Residents of the camp, which is the poorest among the Palestinian refugee camps in Syria, are still rely on financial and relief assistance provided by UNRWA from time to time.

Civil Work Committees

Charity Commission for the Relief of Palestinian People launched 'Warm Me' project in order to collect donations for providing firewood for the besieged people of the Yarmouk refugee camp because of the siege imposed on them by the regular army and PFGC groups for 861 days respectively, which prevents the introduction of food, medical supplies, and fuel.



Lebanon

Palestinians of Syria Committee in Lebanon began to implement a series of training courses in design program 'Photoshop' for all its members, aiming to develop the talents of its volunteers through free, certified, and specialized training courses to be ready to participate in volunteer work with high efficiency.




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It is noteworthy that this is the first session within three sessions will be organized by the Committee for the Palestinian refugees from Syria in Lebanon.



Numbers and Statistics till 9/11/2015

- 15,500 Palestinian Syrian refugees in Jordan, 45,000 Palestinian Syrian refugees in Lebanon, and 6,000 refugees in Egypt, according to the UNRWA's statistics till July 2015.
- At least 36,000 Palestinian Syrian refugees have reached Europe during the last 4 years.
- The Yarmouk Camp: Siege, imposed by the Regular Army and PFGC, continued for 860 days respectively. In addition, power cuts continued for more than 930 days, water was cut for 420 days respectively. The number of victims due to the siege has reached to 182 victims.
- Al Sbeina Camp: Regular Army is still preventing the residents of the camp to return back to their houses for 721 days respectively.



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- Handarat Camp: Residents have left the camp for 922 days after the Syrian Opposition Groups controlled it.
- Dara'a Camp: It is now almost 566 days without water and 70% of its buildings were demolished.
- Jarmana, AL Saieda Zainab, Al Raml, Al Aedein Camps in Homs and Hamma: A relatively quiet situation in light of the economic crises.
- Khan Al Sheih Camp: Roads linking the camp to the city center are still closed except for Zakia- Khan Al Shieh road.
