Latest Developments

AGPS issued a new report entitled "Coming Up from Under Rubble" to underscore the abject humanitarian situation endured by Palestinian refugees in/from war-torn Syria.

The 50-page report includes 31 success stories achieved by Palestinian refugees from Syria despite the challenges and trauma inflicted by more than 12 years of conflict, displacement, and economic hardship.

The report also covers success stories by Palestinian refugees with special needs, who have been subjected to bullying and marginalization.

Hundreds of displaced Palestinian refugees in/from Syria have achieved success stories, despite the traumatic upshots wrought by the daily scenes of bloodshed and destruction across the embattled Syrian territories.

This includes scores of refugee students who have obtained the highest scores at their academic institutions; hundreds of refugee sportsmen/sportswomen who snatched the first places in regional and international competitions; dozens of artists who received renowned literary awards for their products and performances; and several housewives who turned trauma into a space of creativity.

Meanwhile, dozens of Palestinian refugee families fled Deraa Camp and AlSadd neighborhood, south of Syria, due to the simmering clashes between local armed groups and ISIS militias.

At least 45 Palestinian families, including 15 from Deraa Camp, fled to neighboring areas as violence has gone unabated.

A few days earlier, three civilians, including a Palestinian refugee, sustained wounds due to the simmering clashes with ISIS militias in AlSadd neighborhood, in Deraa city, south of Syria.

Palestinian refugee Amar AlAyedi was gunned down in the chest as he tended to a wounded person in the area. A 60-year-old man also succumbed to his wounds.

Sometime earlier, local armed groups reportedly seized a number of buildings where ISIS militias had been taking shelter.

Opposition forces in Syria imposed a curfew on and around Deraa refugee camp while UNRWA suspended classes at its schools in the area.

In another development, a blast was reported near Zaher Mosque, in AlHusainiya Camp for Palestinian refugees, in Rif Dimashq, after a power generator exploded due to a short circuit.

Palestinian refugees in AlHusainiya Camp, in Rif Dimashq, continue to denounce the chronic power blackouts rocking the area, saying power has been cut across a number of residential neighborhoods for over 20 hours daily.

In the best of cases, power is operated every six hours for a one-hour time-span.

In the meantime, displaced Palestinian families in AlRaml refugee camp, in Latakia, have voiced deep concern over the upshots of the heavy rains that swamped residential neighborhoods.

The area is already overburdened by poor infrastructure and hackneyed sanitation networks.

Pictures and videos circulated on social media show dozens of homes and residential alleyways as being swamped by rain deluges and wastewater.

Speaking with AGPS, a resident said local authorities have turned deaf ears to civilians' frequent appeals to work on enhancing infrastructure and repairing sanitation networks.

Latakia is home to the Palestinian refugee camp of AlRaml, where the humanitarian situation has already been marred by multiple hardships owing to the poor infrastructure, absence of vital services, and price inflation.

After more than twelve years of conflict, Palestine refugees continue to be one of the most vulnerable groups in Syria with immense humanitarian needs. Hundreds of displaced Palestinian families continue to launch cries for help as a freezing winter season has enveloped the region.
