The situation of Palestinian refugees in Syria

Latest Developments

A Palestinian refugee sheltered in AlNeirab Camp, in the northern Syrian province of Aleppo, was arrested by Syrian regime forces on August 10 on claims of name resemblance.

The refugee, born in 1980, was detained as he attempted to issue identity documents to his 14-year-old daughter.

In 2018, the refugee was held in custody for 28 days over similar allegations.

The arrestee presented his identity documents at the passports authority. However, Syrian authorities detained him on claims he has been wanted since 2021.

On March 15, 2022 Palestinian refugee Zaydan Ahmad Zaydan, born in 1974 and raised in AlNeirab Camp, in the northern Syrian province of Aleppo, was arrested by Syrian security forces over claims of name resemblance.

Along similar lines, Palestinian young man Firas Abu AlAla, who disappeared on August 9, was spotted in Berlin, Germany.

Firas, born and raised in Yarmouk Camp for Palestinian refugees, south of Damascus, fled war-torn Syria to Germany with his family following the conflict outbreak.

According to AGPS data, 333 Palestinian refugees from Syria, including 37 women and girls, have gone missing since the outbreak of the Syrian warfare.

In another development, Palestinian refugees in the AlHusainiya camp, in Rif Dimashq, launched distress signals over the arbitrary checkpoint pitched by the Syrian regime forces, blocking refugees' access out of and into the area.

Palestinians and Syrians passing through the area have been subjected to intensive inspection and questioning.

Local sources said security forces have been chasing down Palestinians and Syrians evading military service.

Security forces have reportedly forced drivers to pay money in order to be allowed to cross the checkpoint.



Over recent years, residents of AlHusainiya camp have denounced the absence of vital services in the area. The transportation crisis, price leap, absence of relief assistance and healthcare, power and water crises, and high rates of unemployment have made survival quite difficult for dozens of displaced Palestinian families.

In the meantime, UNRWA in Syria has conducted a social and economic survey in Ein Tel (Hindarat) camp northeast of Aleppo, in northern Syria.

The survey aims to assess the situation and needs of Palestinian refugees along with the damage inflicted on their houses.

Palestinian refugees have been grappling with dire conditions in Hindarat Camp due to the lack of humanitarian assistance and life-saving services. The majority of families have been taking shelter in buildings rented at extremely steep costs in the poverty-stricken area. A severe water and power crisis also continues to rock the camp.

Heavy shelling on Handarat and bloody shootouts between the government forces and the opposition outfits led to the destruction of over 90% of buildings in the camp. The confrontations culminated in the government's takeover of the camp along with other zones in Aleppo and the displacement of its residents on April 27, 2013.
