Latest Developments

478 Palestinian women and girls have been pronounced dead in Syria's seven-year conflict. 106 others have also been locked up in Syrian government dungeons.

According to AGPS data, 40 female Palestinian refugees died as a result of torture in Syrian jails. A number of victims were identified in pictures leaked by Syrian breakaways.



AGPS has also learned that 38 Palestinian women and girls from Syria have gone missing inside and outside of the Syrian territories.

Meanwhile, four-year-old Hadil AlAyathi has been identified as the youngest Palestinian detainee secretly held in Syrian government prisons for six years along with her mother Taghrid Eissat.

The mother and her daughter were kidnapped in March 2013 as they passed through the government-run AlAlaaf checkpoint, in al Hajar AlAswad area, adjacent to Yarmouk Camp. Their fate and whereabouts remain mysterious.



AGPS continues to urge the Syrian authorities to disclose the fate of the two detainees among other Palestinian refugees held behind prison bars.

In the meantime, Palestinian refugees detained in the socalled Krit Gendarme Central detention center in the Turkish city of Antakya for nearly 30 days have slammed the Palestine Liberation Organization and Palestinian factions for turning their back on their ceaseless appeals for urgent intervention.

The detainees said the Palestine Embassy and Palestinian factions in Turkey pledged to broker their release with the Turkish authorities. But none of such promises has seen the day.

10 Palestinian refugees have been detained by the Turkish authorities at a so-called Krit Gendarme-Central detention center for the 28th consecutive day.

The list of detainees includes Jamil Khalil Emara, Ghufran Hamid, Ahmad Khaled Mohamed, Amal Hamid, eight-month-old Naya, Khaled Mahmoud AlKhatib, Ahmad Emad Mustafa and his wife and daughter, and Abdul Rahman Mahmoud.

Displaced Palestinian families north of Syria continue to sound the alarm over their children's lack of access to education as a result of the enforced deportation they have been subjected to.

They said even the private school established in the area is made up of poorly equipped tents that are not fit to study in and risk to fall into pieces in the winter season. Neither professional training staff nor proper furniture are available at the school.



The families, who got displaced from Khan Eshieh and Yarmouk refugee camps, urged UNRWA to take its responsibility as regards the crisis and make urgent steps to smooth children's access to education in northern Syria.
