## **Victims**

Palestinian refugee Mohamed Zakaria al-Tatari, 27, was killed after Israeli warplanes struck multiple targets in the blockaded Gaza Strip with missiles.

The casualty had taken shelter in Yarmouk Camp, before he returned to Gaza, fleeing war-torn Syria.

Some 1,000 Palestinian refugees have returned to the Gaza Strip since the outburst of the Syrian warfare, in 2011.



## **Latest Developments**

An ex-prisoner who was released from the AlSumariya jail, run by Syria's Air Intelligence Forces, said he had seen the Palestinian refugee Mohamed Mahmoud Mohamed, born in 1986, in the aforementioned prison.





Mohamed, a resident of Damascus, was kidnapped by progovernment forces in 2013.

At the same time, a Palestinian refugee was kidnapped by the Syrian security forces on the Syrian-Lebanese borders on his way back to Syria from Lebanon.

AGPS has kept the arrestee's name secret over security concerns. The young man is a resident of Yarmouk Camp and in his 30s.

AGPS documented the incarceration of 1,700 Palestinian refugees in Syrian state dungeons, where 553 others have been tortured to death.

Meanwhile, the Turkish coast guards have been searching for 10 missing migrants after their boat sank in the Aegean Sea.

Anadolu Agency said a number of migrants were rescued as part of a search-and-rescue operation launched after a Greece-bound boat, with a total of 15 people on board, went down off the coast of Dikili, close to the Greek island of Lesbos. Earlier, two of the migrants managed to swim to shore to seek help.





Although their numbers have decreased in recent years, Palestinian refugees from Syria and other tension-stricken zones across the MENA region still try to cross into Greece from nearby Turkey in the hopes of making their way to other European countries.

In the meantime, UNRWA transferred cash aids for the Palestinians of Syria in Lebanon via ATM cards.

Every Palestinian family from Syria received a rental allowance of \$100 and a food allowance of 27\$ per every refugee.

Nearly 31,000 Palestinian refugees from Syria have sought shelter in Lebanon, where they have been subjected to a precarious legal status and dire socio-economic conditions owing to their lack of access to the local labor market and absence of relief assistance.
