Latest Developments

Dozens of displaced Palestinian families from Syria in the Lebanese AlBekaa region urged UNRWA to hand them much-needed humanitarian aids with the advent of a freezing winter season.

Palestinian families taking refuge in AlBekaa have been struggling for survival in the face of the sub-zero temperatures rocking the mountainous region and the rain downpours swamping their poorly-equipped tents.



Price leap and steep rental fees, along with the absence of relief aids, have made life unbearable for the Palestinian refugees in AlBekaa.

Some 31,000 Palestinians from Syria have sought refuge in Lebanon, where they have been enduring exacerbated living conditions and subjected to a precarious legal status.

Meanwhile, residents of AlHusainiya Camp have raised concerns over their children's safety as packs of stray dogs have been spotted in and around the camp.

The refugees appealed to the concerned authorities and NGOs to take urgent action over the spread of feral dogs in the camp and to work out the chronic power outages in the area.



Offensives launched on AlHusainiya Camp using MIG warplanes led to the death of dozens of civilians and to massive material destruction. Bloody shootouts between the opposition outfits and the Syrian government forces culminated in the latter's takeover of the camp on October 9, 2013.



In the meantime, Palestinian young man Mahmoud Hanino, from AlNeirab Camp in Aleppo, has been enduring a mysterious fate in Syrian state prisons, where he has been locked up since 2015.



AGPS documented the incarceration of 1,709 Palestinian refugees in Syrian government dungeons, among them 108 women and girls.



In another development, a set of leisure activities was held by the Psychological Support Team at the Palestinian Red Crescent, in partnership with the Danish Red Cross, in an attempt to entertain children and people with disabilities in Khan Dannun Camp for Palestinian refugees, in Rif Dimashq.

Living conditions in Khan Dannun have sharply deteriorated due to the lack of financial resources, high unemployment rates, and frequent water and power outages. A transportation crisis has added bad to worse in the area.
