Latest Developments

Dozens of Palestinian and Syrian families have fled Idlib and nearby zones due to the heavy air strikes launched by Syrian and Russian fighter jets.

Over the past week, Syrian and Russian forces have carried out daily air strikes on and around Idlib province, north of Syria, leaving dozens of civilians, mostly women and children, dead.

An AGPS reporter said dozens of Palestinian families displaced from Yarmouk and Khan Eshieh refugee camps, along with other areas south of Damascus, have voiced deep concern over their fate in the embattled northern Syria territories.

Sometime earlier, a number of Palestinian families have survived deadly strikes launched on AlKusur neighborhood by the Russian air forces.



Palestinian families taking shelter north of Syria have appealed to all humanitarian and human rights institutions to urgently step in and work on protecting them and their children against deadly attacks.



In another development, Director-General of the Palestine Liberation Organization's (PLO) Political Department, Ambassador Anwar Abdul Hadi, updated the director of the Palestinian Red Crescent in Syria, Atef Ibrahim, on the decision of the Palestinian Authority (PA) President Mahmoud Abbas to buy medical equipment, including an anaesthetic machine, an oxygen concentrator, and an X-ray machine, worth \$250,000 Million to Yafa Hospital, in Damascus.

After eight years of conflict, Palestine refugees continue to be one of the most vulnerable groups in Syria with immense humanitarian needs. The war has impacted Palestine refugees inside as well as outside the Syrian territories.

Thousands of Palestinian refugees have been grappling with dire living conditions and taking refuge in poorly-equipped refugee tents. At the same time, dozens of displaced families have been trapped in hard-to-reach zones north of Syria.

Meanwhile, head of AlHajar AlAswad city council Khaled Khamis announced the launch of debris clearance works on the main access road of AlHajar AlAswad neighborhood, south of Damascus, in an attempt to smooth civilians' movement across the area.

Khamis said the move will pave the way for the launch of reconstruction works and the rehabilitation of infrastructure, pending the safe return of families to their homes in habitable neighborhoods.



Thousands of Palestinian refugees took shelter in AlHajar AlAswad, which came under heavy shelling since 2013 and a crippling siege after ISIS crept into the area. Offensives launched by the Syrian and Russian forces resulted in heavy material damage and took away the lives of dozens of civilians.



In the meantime, Palestinian refugee Kadri Subhi Ismail, aged 49, has been held in Syrian government prisons since June 18, 2015.

Kadri, a resident of Aleppo province, was kidnapped by Syrian security forces as he passed through a checkpoint in Yarmouk refugee camp. His condition and whereabouts could not be identified.





1,769 Palestinian refugees, including 108 women and girls, have been locked up in Syrian government dungeons, according to AGPS data.
