Latest Developments

Palestinian refugee Kamar Bilal Hafedh and her students were killed as the Syrian regime army and their Russian partners struck Ariha city, in northern Syria.

The air strike left 10 people dead, including four children and a woman. 20 other persons sustained injuries.

Kamar, an Arabic language instructor, was born in 1993 and is currently sheltered in Ariha, south of Idlib.

AGPS data indicates that 488 Palestinian refugee women have been pronounced dead in war-torn Syria due to deadly shelling and fatal torture in prison, among other causes.

In another development, Palestinian refugee Udai Shehabi has launched calls for urgent treatment in Turkey, saying he has failed to secure the remaining 120,000 Turkish liras to receive medical treatment at a Turkish hospital.

Speaking with AGPS, Udai said he was displaced from Yarmouk Camp to Qudsaya town, in Rif Dimashq, and illegally travelled to Turkey by land. He got his leg broken while working in Turkey.

He added that his health condition has taken a turn for the worse, 10 days after he received emergency treatment. He was again transferred to a hospital after he fell into a faint. He has undergone



more than one surgery to repair his broken leg bone and got metal plates installed in his leg. He is still in need of other surgeries.

Udai has appealed to Turkish charities and international humanitarian organizations to help him secure the sum of money needed for his urgent treatment before an amputation becomes the only option.

Along similar lines, Palestinian refugee Mohamed Husain Mousa died of wounded he sustained after a gas cylinder went off at his house in Khan Dannun refugee camp, in Rif Dimashq.

Mohamed was pronounced dead at the Damascus Clinic on Tuesday evening due to serious burns inflicted on his vulnerable body.

Meanwhile, the rubble-clearance committee in Yarmouk Camp said Syrian authorities extended the time-limit for debris-removal by civilians from their houses and shops in Yarmouk Camp until November 15.

The committee urged the residents to transfer the cleared mounds of rubble on the outskirts of their residential neighborhoods so as not to hinder the movement of workers and vehicles.

In the meantime, Palestinian refugee families sheltered in and around Jaramana Camp have raised concerns over the increasing theft attempts and home-burglary reported in the area.

A masked thieve has entered a civilian house and attempted to steal fuel, before he fled away.



In its "Syria Regional Crisis Emergency Appeal 2021", UNRWA said that protracted displacement, deteriorating socio-economic conditions aggravated by the consequences of the COVID-19 pandemic, dire humanitarian needs and protection concerns continue to affect the lives of Palestine refugees in Syria.

Many PRS lost their sources of income; refugee camps have seen unprecedented levels of destruction; rental prices have dramatically gone up; undernourishment and poverty have been a daily nightmare.

Due to the serious protection gaps, children have been forced to drop out of school and join armed groups to help feed their starving families.
