Latest Developments

Statistics released by AGPS on the occasion of the Mother's Day documented the death of 484 Palestinian women and girls all the way through Syria's eight-year conflict, according to death toll data for the period from March 2011 until March 2019.

The list includes 240 female refugees who died under shelling; 68 who died as a result of the blockade and medical neglect in Yarmouk Camp; and 28 others who were fatally shot by snipers.



37 female refugees were, meanwhile, killed in blasts; 24 were gunned down; 26 drowned at sea; five female refugees were executed; 34 were tortured to death in Syrian prisons; and 20 others died of other reasons, including murder, assassination, suicide, suffocation, health setbacks, and Israeli bullet fire.

As for the geographical distribution of the victims, Damascus topped the list with 163 female refugees, followed by Rif Dimashq, with 152 casualties. 20 others died in Aleppo, 66 in Daraa, and



eight in Hums. One Palestinian woman was pronounced dead in Hama and another in AlRaml Camp in Latakia.

In another development, wildfires broke out at three residential barracks in AlNeirab Camp for Palestinian refugees in Aleppo after a short circuit suddenly rocked the area.

The burned homes belong to Palestinian refugee Abu Frias AlHasan, Ibrahim Ibrahim, Mohamed Ibrahim, Abu Kassem Sa'ed, and the Sakr family.



Residents of AlNeirab Camp have been grappling with dire socioeconomic conditions as a result of the price hike, high rates of unemployment, and absence of relief assistance.

Along the same line, Palestinian refugees from Syria sheltered on Greek islands continue to sound distress signals over the exacerbated humanitarian conditions and fragile legal status they have been subjected to.

Hundreds of Palestinians from Syria have risked their lives onboard the "death boats" to Greece, rummaging around for a



momentary respite from the daily scenes of bloodshed and destruction.

Several refugees have docked in Izmir, Mersin, and Istanbul, among other Turkish destinations, after they have received death and detention threats by the Turkish gendarmerie.

AGPS has kept record of the death of dozens of Palestinian refugees onboard Greece-bound ships. Several others have been arrested by Turkish coast guards.

Meanwhile, the family of Palestinian refugee Abdullah Ahmed Akleh, a resident of AlHajar AlAswad, in Damascus, have called on the human rights institutions countrywide and overseas to work on disclosing the fate of their son, who has been missing for over six years running.

In appeals emailed to AGPS, the family said they have lost contact with Abdullah since 2013, while on his way back home from Khan Eshieh Camp to AlHajar AlAswad.

Over 300 Palestinian refugees, male and female, have gone missing in war-ragged Syria, half of whom are from Yarmouk Camp, south of Damascus, according to AGPS statistics.

In the meantime, dozens of Palestinian youths volunteered for a psychological support training course kick-started on Saturday March 16 in Jaffa Medical Complex, Bisan Hospital in AlAyedeen Camp for Palestinian refugees in Hums, and in AlNeirab Camp in Aleppo.



The five-day course has been supervised by the Red Crescent, in cooperation with the Danish Red Cross.
