## **Latest Developments**

AGPS kept record of the death of 50 Palestinians from Syria due to war-related incidents in July 2018, compared to 19 in July 2017.

36 Palestinians died in unknown locations; six refugees died in Daraa, six in AlSuweida, another in Idlib, and one more Palestinian in Latakia.

In July 2017, 10 Palestinians were pronounced dead in Rif Dimashq, three in Hama, one refugee in Daraa, another in Damascus, one more in AlRiqa, and another in Aleppo. Two Palestinians died in unknown locations.



Meanwhile, families deported from southern Damascus to northern Syria, called on the concerned authorities, particularly the Palestinian Authority and UNRWA, to urgently step in and work on improving living conditions for dozens of impoverished families in the area.

Hundreds of Palestinian refugee families displaced from Yarmouk to northern Syria have been subjected to an abject humanitarian situation due to the lack of basic services and separation of family members across local shelters.



Dozens of displaced civilians have been taking cover in makeshift tents in such under-equipped refugee camps as Deir Ballout, where water supplies have almost run out.



The displaced families appealed to the concerned bodies to work on improving their conditions and securing their access to education and health care, among other vital services.

Statistics conducted by Khayra Ummah Association found out that 1,292 displaced Palestinian families have sought shelter in northern Syria.

In the meantime, Palestinian refugee Ghaleb Sa'id Suleiman was released from a Syrian government penitentiary, following a 30-day detention period.

Several Palestinians sheltered in Khan Eshieh Camp were arrested by pro-government forces on their way out of the camp following a deal sealed between the opposition outfits and the government.

AGPS data indicates that 247 Palestinians from Khan Eshieh Camp have been locked up in Syrian dungeons.

As figures in AGPS's 16th statistical report for the period from March 2011 until June 2018 issued on August 2, the number of



Palestinian residents of Khan Eshieh Camp arrested by the Syrian government forces during the first half of 2018 make up 42% of the overall number of Palestinian detainees.

Five Palestinians from Khan Eshieh Camp were arrested during the same period. The list also included two Palestinians from Yarmouk Camp, three from AlNeirab Camp, one refugee from AlSabina Camp, and three Palestinians in unidentified locations.

The report documented the incarceration of 1,800 Palestinians in Syrian government prisons, among them 105 women and girls, during the period under examination.

Along the same line, hundreds of Palestinian refugees who fled war-torn Syria to Europe have faced obstacles while trying to learn the host language.

Asylum-seekers who have arrived in new countries and are striving to learn the new language continue to face difficulties in adjusting to the host community, particularly in northern Europe, and accessing the labor market.

As a result, scores of refugees in such countries as Norway, Sweden, Denmark, the Netherlands, and Germany have registered with relief institutions as they sought humanitarian assistance.
