Latest Developments

Palestinian refugees living and/or working in the diaspora continue to provide humanitarian assistance to Palestinians sheltered in war-ravaged Syria.

Recently, a number of Palestinian refugees abroad raised funds to help provide meat to residents of AlNeirab Camp, in Aleppo.

At the same time, a Palestinian expatriate, who refused to reveal his name, paid the debts of a number of Palestinian families sheltered in Jaramana Camp.

The donor paid a sum of money to contribute to the medical treatment of a quadriplegic women. He also bought medicines for a cancer-stricken patient.

Over 80% of PRS live in extreme poverty and rely on humanitarian assistance as their main source of income. 86% of PRS households are reported to be in debt.

Along similar lines, NGOs and relief institutions handed over meat portions to Palestinian refugees across war-ravaged Syria.

The Palestine Commission for Relief and Development in partnership with the Islamic Organization for Relief of Orphans and Poor People handed over meat to 15,000 displaced families in opposition-held zones in northern Syria.



At the same time, Muhjat AlQuds Foundation distributed meat to orphans' families and vulnerable people in government-held zones, including Qudsaya, Jaramana, Khan Dannun, AlTal, AlDhiabiya, and Khirbet AlShiyab.

Ten years after demonstrations started in Syria, the majority of Palestinian refugees sheltered in the war-torn country have been grappling with an abject humanitarian situation.

UN data indicates that over half of the Palestine refugees in the country have been displaced at least once because of the brutal conflict that ensued, including 120,000 who have sought safety in neighbouring countries, mainly Lebanon and Jordan, and beyond;

Once a vibrant community of over 550,000 people, Palestinians had come to Syria in two main waves in 1948 and 1967 to settle in 12 camps across the country. Yarmouk, the most famous of the Palestine refugee camps, became known as "the capital of Palestine refugees."

438,000 Palestine refugees remain in the country – 91 per cent of whom live in absolute poverty - and who have been among those worst affected by the conflict.

Meanwhile, residents of Khan Eshieh Camp, in Rif Dimashq, and representatives of Palestinian factions in Syria laid a wreath at the martyrs site.

Flours were offered to pay tribute to Palestinians killed in war-torn Syria.



A number of Palestinian refugees sheltered in Khan Esheih camp have been pronounced dead since anti-regime protests broke out in Syria in 2011. Several others were killed by the Israeli occupation forces in the Golan Heights border area.
