## **Latest Developments**

Residents of Jaramana Camp for Palestinian refugees continue to sound alarm bells over the simmering abductions carried out against civilians in the area.

A few days earlier, a gangster attempted to kidnap a woman and her son on the main access road near UNRWA schools, but fled right away after the woman shouted loudly.

The residents said they have been blackmailed over their appeals for release and protection.

Over recent years, several civilians, including children, have gone missing in Jaramana Camp. Palestinian child Zein Ahmad Taameh disappeared from AlAmeen Street in Jaramana Camp on Monday, April 1, on his way back home from Palestine School, run by UNRWA. Three-year-old Palestinian child Teym Samer Jamil Surur, a resident of Sakhnin Street in Jaramana Camp, in Rif Dimashq, has also gone missing since April 18. His family continues to appeal for information over his condition and whereabouts.

According to AGPS data, over 330 Palestinian refugees have gone missing in war-torn Syria, mostly from Yarmouk Camp, south of Damascus.

Along similar lines, residents of AlHusainiya Camp for Palestinian refugees, in Rif Dimashq, railed against the increasing motor vehicle theft in the area.



Recently, a taxi owned by a Palestinian refugee was stolen by thieves. The taxi is the refugee's sole livelihood.

Most of the stolen cars are of the SABA brand due to defects in the car lock. Motorcycles have also been stolen from the area.

A number of residents filed complaints at the local police station. But the investigations have been fruitless so far.

Meanwhile, residents of AlDhiabiya town, in Rif Dimashq, said they have been left without potable water due to frequent water and power blackouts.

The residents have been forced to buy water from mobile tanks at exorbitant prices that reach up to 2,500 Syrian Pounds per 1,000 liters.

In another development, the board of directors of the Palestine Charity has called on the concerned authorities to work on rehabilitating its mission in Yarmouk Camp, in Damascus.

This came in a meeting held on Wednesday, November 25, with the director of the General Authority for Palestinian Arab Refugees (GAPAR), Ali Mustafa.

GAPAR's chief pledged to do his best in order to support the charity and restore its relief operations in Yarmouk Camp.

In the meantime, a total of 46 irregular migrants were rescued from boats off the coast of Turkey's Aydın and Mersin provinces,



Turkish Coast Guard Command announced in a statement on Thursday.

The boats carrying 46 irregular migrants were pushed back to Turkish territorial waters by Greek Coast Guard forces, according to the statement.

Turkey has traditionally been a major transit port for irregular immigrants to enter the European countries.

According to the official reports, 454,662 irregular migrants held across the country in 2019.
