## **Latest Developments**

A Palestinian woman sheltered in AlNeirab Camp, in Aleppo, was kidnapped along with her two children by anonymous gangsters.

The woman and her children were on their way to Lebanon. AGPS has kept their names secret over security concerns.

The kidnappers told the captives' family that they will only release them on an arson of 3,000 USD.

335 Palestinian refugees from Syria, including 38 women and girls, have gone missing since the outbreak of the Syrian warfare, AGPS has found out.

Most of those who have disappeared in the country are residents of Yarmouk Camp for Palestinian refugees, south of Damascus.

In another development, two young men fell from a destroyed building while clearing debris from Yarmouk Camp for Palestinian refugees, in Damascus.

The wounded were rushed to AlShuhada Clinic before they were transferred to another hospital in Damascus. Their condition remains unknown.

Mounds of debris continue to be spotted everywhere across the ravaged Yarmouk Camp for Palestinian refugees, blocking civilians' access to their homes and property.



Some three years ago, precisely on April 19, 2018, Syrian regime forces and their Russian allies showered the camp with missiles and mortars, resulting in dozens of deaths among Palestinian refugees and hundreds of injuries.

Over 60% of buildings and facilities in Yarmouk Camp have been reduced to rubble and civilian homes razed to the ground.

Before the crisis started in 2011, Yarmouk was a bustling home to almost 30 percent of the Palestine refugee population in Syria. Today, the weight of displacement, hardship and the loss of loved ones add to the difficult living conditions in Yarmouk.

Meanwhile, Palestinian refugees called on the Palestinian Authority, the Syria Ambassador, and member of Fatah Central Committee Samir AlRefai to provide them with updates concerning the promises made by the PA President Mahmoud Abbas to provide aid to 5,000 Palestinian families in Syria.

Activists and refugees slammed the PA for its apathy regarding the multiple hardships they have been enduring in Syria.

In the meantime, residents of AlAyedeen camp for Palestinian refugees, in Hums, continue to appeal to the concerned authorities to secure transportation means to give them daily lifts to their destinations and workplaces.

Students, workers, and sick people have denounced the overcrowding and unpunctuality of public means of transport,



saying they have been made to wait for hours daily to reach their destinations.

Palestinians taking shelter in AlAyedeen Camp in Hums have been facing a deteriorating humanitarian situation as a result of the price leap, sharp shortage in fuel supplies, the frequent power blackouts, and absence of humanitarian assistance. High rates of unemployment and the security turmoil rocking the region have made the situation far more alarming.

Along similar lines, residents of Khan Eshieh refugee camp denounced the accumulation of trash piles on Khan Eshieh's western access roads and outside of the high school.

Palestinian refugees said the phenomenon poses serious health threats and puts their children's hygiene at risk.

Civilians urged the concerned authorities and URNWA to seriously work on clearing garbage accumulated on the roadsides.

Palestinian families taking refuge in Khan Eshieh camp, in Rif Dimashq, have been struggling with squalid humanitarian conditions inflicted by the ten-year warfare.
